President Answers Contest Questions

Our last Board Meeting included a vigorous discussion about the Roundup Contests. Apparently there are still some confused members and some improvements to be made to the system. Here are some highlights: Youth Contests

Recent years have seen a major decline in participation for youth contests. The board decided that a June entry deadline was impractical and eliminated any help we might receive from active school writing programs. To remedy the situation it was decided to have a separate youth contest with an April 30, deadline. The contest will include poetry, with a \$2 entry, and prose with a \$3 judging fee.

Information will be distributed to writing teachers throughout the state. Prizes of \$30, \$20 and \$10 will be awarded in each category with possible multiple prizes if there is a large response.

Published Category

Some members still have apprehensions about the Publication category. They believe that quills are impossible to win, many don't understand the concept of a collection and some feel that the competition is unfair.

Competition. I believe our tradition is so thick with winners and losers, prizes and awards that it's hard to grasp a simple search for excellence. The publication category is not a contest where one entry is judged against another, but against a standard of individual excellence. Judges are instructed to reward excellence over mediocrity with no regard to the number of awards. There is no quota or limit in any genre. Entries are judged for the excellence of their message and presentation, not for their placement on some hierarchy of contestants. This is why we can accept all types of writing in one category. It is a category, not a contest!

Collection: Entries in the Publication category can be single works or collections of work. The pieces can be (continued on page 3)

Kathy Lloyd has an elevenyear career as a fiction writer. She has developed a graphic, analytical approach to writing fiction which has helped both new and experienced writers. Kathy will be the featured instructor for two sessions. The first session will cover Managing and Maintaining Conflict and the second, Techniques for Creating Compelling Characters. Kathy is the author of two published novels, A Healing Season and Blue Skies and Promises.

Randy Burgoyne, president of Burgoyne Computers in Salt Lake City will speak on How to Choose the Right Computer.

Valerie Holiday is currently an editor for Wasatch Review. She holds a master's degree and has a background in teaching. Her topic for two sessions will be Short Stories.

Margaret Traub-Aguirre is the editor for Salt Lake Magazine, among the best of the slick regional magazines available. She will talk about What Editors Want From Writers.

These are just some of our exciting speakers, there will be others who will fill the day for writers of all interests.

Registration begins at 8:30. Admission for League members will be \$10, \$15 for non-members. Lunch will be on your own but there are several restaurants and fast food outlets near the college.

unrelated or united by some theme or
genre type. The choice is yours. The change
was made to reduce entry fees for members. You may choose to submit five published poems as a group for one entry fee
or as five individual pieces for five entry
fees. But remember the only criteria is
excellence, weight is not a factor.

Scarcity: To those who believe duills : are impossible to earn, I would point to the fact that in the two years since the publication rules changed, we have awarded more than twice as many quills as in previous years. This is due to the fact that not one "no contest" has been declared due to a shortage of entries. Members have earned quills for single poems, articles and stories. Quills have also been earned for collections which have featured single genre and combination works. Quills have been awarded for published work in areas where there have previously never been enough entries to give an award.

So if it's a quill you want, forget about beating everyone else. Do your best work. Get it published. Send in an entry.

Additions

New to this year's contest rules is the publication of the number of entries in each category for last year's contest. The board hoped that this information would stimulate interest in some of the smaller contest categories and that members would broaden their range of writing.

As part of our continued effort to coordinate with other writing organizations, LUW has agreed to co-sponsor a writer's workshop this summer.


The workshop will be conducted by Wasatch Review International and is tentatively scheduled for June or July. In exchange for our participation League members will receive reduced admission for the event.

The League of Utah Writers is funded in part by the Utah Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts

Wasatch Mountain Fiction Writers presents the annual "First 20 Pages of Your Novel Contest"

Eligibility First twenty pages of novel by unpublished authors. Any fiction genre except childrens' picture books.

Manuscript Format A cover sheet must be included with author's name, address, phone number, and fiction genre. Do not place author's name on any other page. Type must be on one side of each page only, double-spaced, and have paragraph indentations of five spaces. Margins must be one and one-quarter inch. Don't right-justify your work. In the upper right corner of each page, capitalized the novel's title, abbreviated if necessary, and the page number (e.g., PACIFIC BEAT/1). On page 1 of the prologue or first chapter, center the prologue/chapter title in capital letters half way down the page. Double-space, then begin the body of your manuscript.

Fee A \$10 entry fee, payable to Wasatch Mountain Fiction Writers, is required with each submission. Authors may submit multiple entries, each with a separate \$10 entry fee. An SASE must be enclosed for the return of the manuscript and critique sheets.

Deadline Entries must be postmarked by June 1, 1993.

Notification Winners will be notified by mail before October 1, 1993.
