


Quill Winner Spotlights


What is the hardest thing about writing, and what advice would you give to people to overcome it?

How do you handle frustrating moments as an author?

I majored in English, but that was because I loved to read, not to write. The love of writing actually came about ten years after I graduated college and I was able to write whatever I wanted to. :) I went years without reading an actual novel. I was too busy changing diapers and feeding cute babies and reading them stories on my lap, which is actually where my path to publication began.

One afternoon, four years ago, I was reading a book of Disney stories to my kids and we read the *Cinderella* story. As I closed the book and my kids went back to their Legos, I thought, "What if the slipper fit someone else?" I couldn't shake the question out of my baby food, potty-training, sleep deprived brain. As soon as my boys' pillows hit their Lightning McQueen pillows that night, I ran to the computer and started to write. And in the days and weeks following, I wrote and wrote in every "spare" second I had, or could create. I felt this unbelievable energy and I was amazed as this story that had been somewhere in my mind for years began to take shape. I couldn't sleep. I only wanted to write.

As soon as I thought it was "finished," I looked up books that were similar to mine in genre, content, and setting, saw who published them, researched their submission process, and submitted it to publishers who 1) didn't require an agent, 2) were willing to work with a lowly, inexperienced first-time author. I sent it in to a couple of publishers . . . who rejected it. It was like someone died. It was like I died. Just kidding . . . kind of. But each time I got it back, I fixed it up.

My third time I submitted it, it was accepted and I cried and cried for joy, and then folded a load of laundry because . . . laundry. Once it was accepted, I learned that this was when the real work begins, and that my book was nowhere near "finished." We edited that little book, cleaned and polished her up, until she was ready to greet the world with her head held high. We decided on a cover that captured the simplicity and humility and quiet beauty of this "Ella" I had come to know and adore. And now that she is out there, my hope is that as people come to know Ella, they will adore her, too.

Please continue to gather books for donation. We are partnering with an organization called Empowered Playground that collects books to send to Africa. We will collect books during the Spring and Fall Conferences.


Scholarships:

American Fork Chapter

First off, we're the League's newest chapter, at least for the time being. We had our first meeting on Jan 10, and it was a great success. We officially christened ourselves the "Good AF Writers." We meet every second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:00 PM in the conference room on the ground floor of the American Fork Library. Our primary purpose is to help each other improve our writing skills by giving meaningful and useful critique. We are open to all ages, but keep in mind that we *do* have an open content policy. While we do ask that members warn the group beforehand if they're going to read something that could be objectionable, this still means that you might come into contact with writing that does not agree with you.

Our meetings are going to follow a little bit different format than most groups in the League, but it is one that I have great confidence in, not because I came up with it, but because it's been such a big help for me. What we do is we will ask you to read a brief sample of your work, after which you will pass around a sign up sheet. Those who are interested in your piece jot down their name and email address, and you will email the volunteers up to 5,000 words of your piece. The next time we meet, each of the people who signed up for your piece will take turns giving you feedback on what you did well and what you might improve on. You'll also receive a digital copy of the critiqued work. While it is not required that you sign up for any piece you aren't interested in critiquing, we do encourage members to sign up for between 1 and 3 pieces. This helps members in several ways. It acquaints members with the skill of critique, it helps them to recognize patterns and tropes in writing, and it helps them to consciously pin down strategies and writing methods that do and don't work for them.

We already have some excellent members, and we're excited for the rest of the year!
